Harvard Investigation Summary

Harvard's motto, spelled out on its seal, is VERITAS, the Latin word for "Truth".

When Chinese Ambassador, Xie Feng, visited Harvard's campus last April to proclaim that the Chinese Communist Party has always been a champion of democracy, it was an opportunity for Harvard to live up to its motto and confront him with the truth.

Harvard failed to meet the moment.

When two brave Harvard students rose to challenge the Ambassador, they were physically assaulted. A young man, identified in the media as a fellow Harvard student and the son of Communist Party officials, dragged one of them from the room as Harvard faculty looked on impassively in the front row.

The protestors, who only tried to do what Harvard had taught them, to speak the truth, instead found *themselves* facing a disciplinary investigation at the hands of Harvard University.
